FORESTRY EDUCATION IS STEM EDUCATION

STEM is an approach to learning that integrates the areas of science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Through STEM, students develop skills including problem solving, creativity, critical thinking, and collaboration. FTF's field-based forestry education programs provide an opportunity to introduce students to STEM. Our programs engage students in meaningful learning that is situated in real-world contexts. A great example is our Forest Field Days program. During this program, students calculate the board feet of a Douglas-fir stand; they make observations of wildlife habitat and ask questions to learn about the forest food web; they build a stream using the stream table to better understand erosion; and much more. Back in the classroom, students work collaboratively with their peers using the knowledge gained from their field experience to develop a forest management plan. During this project, students think across STEM disciplines for a deeper understanding of forestry and how forest resources are managed for sustainability. The STEM learning experience that Forest Field Days provides is supported and enhanced by the many local professionals who volunteer with our program—and come from all parts of the forest sector—by providing students with important exposure to forestry-based STEM careers. Our volunteer professionals share their knowledge about forestry and their enthusiasm for their areas of expertise. Through these connections, we seek to spark students' imagination and drive, so they may see themselves studying and working in the forestry field later in life. With increasing emphasis on STEM education in schools and a growing need for people in STEM careers, FTF is proud to provide STEM learning opportunities to local school districts. We will continue to build upon our STEM approach using forestry as an exciting vehicle for learning.

EUGENE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS STUDY FORESTRY

In 2022, Sheldon High School and 4J school district announced a new Career Technical Education (CTE) program in Forestry and Natural Resource Management. The program combines hands-on learning with traditional classroom work where students explore career opportunities and learn the rudiments of forestry and natural resource management in the classroom, laboratory, and field settings. 4J Teacher Dr. Elsa Arias Ninan, who is also a forester and natural resource economist, developed this program and is the lead teacher for forestry classes. FTF is working closly with Dr. Arias Ninan to provide complementary field experiences. This fall, students will visit our field site at Bauman Tree Farm to learn from professional foresters who will guide students in using measurement tools, setting plots, and calculating board feet. Students will also meet the Bauman Tree Farm landowners to tour management units and see firsthand how forests are managed sustainably for timber and other forest resources. During the summer, FTF will provide an immersive program of study for 4J students, where they will earn elective credit as they examine forestry from 'seedling to sawmill'. Students will take field

trips, meet professionals, and engage in hands-on learning experiences. FTF is excited to build a strong partnership with 4J to promote forest careers and support better understanding and appreciation for forestry within the local community.
