



Directions to Bauman Tree Farm for Volunteers

84289 Territorial Road, Eugene, OR 97405

GPS IS NOT RELIABLE TO THIS LOCATION

From Interstate 5 North

- Take exit 195B onto Beltline heading West. Drive 10 miles to the end of Beltline and turn Right (West) onto Hwy. 126. Drive west 1.8 miles, turning left at Greenhill Road (at stop light).
- Greenhill turns into Crow Road, continue 5.9 miles, turning left onto Doane Road. Doane is three miles long and ends at Territorial, turn left.
- Head south on Territorial 1.6 miles and at mile post 29 turn left onto a gravel driveway (Tree Farm sign).

From Interstate 5 South

- Take the Creswell exit.
- Head West through downtown Creswell on Camas Swale Road, which turns into Hamm Road. Hamm Road ends at Territorial Hwy., turn RIGHT.
- At mile post 29 turn right onto a gravel driveway (Tree Farm sign).

From Downtown Eugene

- Head West on 11th Ave. towards Veneta. Turn left onto Greenhill Road, follow last two bullets above.

From University of Oregon

- Head West on 18th Ave. Turn left on Chambers. Turn right on Lorane Hwy. Continue straight at intersection of Lorane Hwy. & Bailey Hill – onto Spencer Creek Road. Turn left onto Briggs Hill and continue until it ends at Territorial (there is not a road sign on Territorial at this intersection), turn left. Gravel driveway is first left after Briggs Hill at mile post 29.

Once on the gravel road, PLEASE DRIVE 15 MPH

Travel the gravel road ½ mile through grazing land. Go straight at the gate and continue straight. You will pass forest on the right and a grass field on your left. Continue past the barn and green shed on your left. At the Y in the gravel road, take the right fork. Continue straight until you see a sign for volunteer parking. Park in the grassy designated area on either side of the road.

NOTE: Bauman Tree Farm is a privately-owned working forest that is NOT open to the public.

Bauman Tree Farm owners, Tom Bauman and Lindsay Reaves, donate the use of their forest to Forests Today & Forever to provide forestry education. Each year Forests Today & Forever brings nearly 3,000 individuals to Bauman Tree Farm to learn about the many benefits that forests provide.
